Definition

Partners from different countries working together on a shared regional policy issue

Objective

To improve the **effectiveness of policy instruments** (Investment for Growth and Jobs programmes in particular)

Project implementation





Exchange of experience (2 to 3 years) resulting in 1 **action plan** per region

Phase 2

Monitoring of action plan implementation (2 years) + possible pilot actions

Focus on Structural Funds (SF)

At least half of policy instruments addressed must be SF





- At least 3 countries represented
- Recommended size: 5 to 10 partners
- Involvement of policy responsible organisations
 - Directly as partners
 - Indirectly through letter of support (and through participation in stakeholder groups)
- Creation of stakeholder groups
 - Contribute to success of learning process by involving all relevant organisations




- Public bodies main → main target group (e.g. local, regional, national authorities)

- Private non-profit bodies



Take the learning process seriously



Read the programme manual



Pay attention to the application form

Fairness and equal treatment principles

- Application Form = the only basis for assessment
 - same information requested from all
 - same technical requirements for all (e.g. text limits)
- Application form has to be self-explanatory

Additional information / clarification not possible after submission



Pay attention to eligibility

One NO disqualifies whole project → no assessment!

- High rate of ineligibility (29.4%)
- Main causes of ineligibility:
 - Letters of support (missing or incorrect)
 - Partner declaration (incorrect amount lower than necessary!)

Make sure all documents are provided and correct.

Don't prepare them at the last minute!



Building an application 5 top tips for success



Best tips according to partners

Ranking in order of usefulness 1(most) to 5 (least)

Tip 1: be selective (in your partnership)

Partnership: project core element which determines policy instruments & regional context

- Involve policymakers directly as partners
- Demonstrate policy relevance of organisations who are not policymakers
- Ensure a wide geographical coverage







Preparation is key to success

Time needed to check:

- Motivation & commitment
- Common interest
- Contribution to the project



Tip 3: be specific



Good application = unique + reflecting partners needs

- Provide concrete details & examples
 Facts and figures when possible
- Show in-depth knowledge of policy instruments addressed

Avoid general and vague information



Tip 4: don't reinvent the wheel







Distinguish yourself from the 130 running projects

Explain your differences (topics? partners?)

Pay attention to general or 'successful' topics



Tip 5: ask for help


