


How to rejuvenate a post-industrial city




The city has a unique story to tell: from the free republic allied to Switzerland, to the "French Manchester" and now a multicultural city which regroups 136 nationalities.

The town has always had its own way and runs counter to its neighbors by its history, architecture or even its sociology.

Mulhouse the Protestant grew up in a catholic region and developed its own spirit of discretion. It goes hardly out of the shadow of other radiant cities of the Upper Rhine (Basel, Strasbourg, and Freiburg).

The city doesn't fit in the postcard cliché of Alsace: a long time weakness, hopefully soon turned into a strength.


Mulhouse has always relied on economic cycles and the beginning of the 2000's was the end of another:

- Loss of thousands of industrial jobs, unemployment and criminality rose to critical levels
- Increase the middle class flight to the suburbs.
- Appearance of lots of industrial wastelands with polluted grounds and huge empty buildings
- Rise in commercial vacancy due to shifting demographics and suburban growth.
