
What is Heritage Interpretation?

- Heritage interpretation is a structured approach to non-formal learning specialised in communicating significant ideas about a place to people on leisure. It establishes a link between visitors and what they can discover at heritage sites such as a nature reserve, a historic site or a museum

Definition of Interpretation, 1957

- Heritage interpretation was first defined in 1957 as:
- "an educational activity which aims to reveal meanings and relationships through the use of original objects, by first hand experience, and by illustrative media, rather than simply to communicate factual information".
- In his book Interpreting our Heritage, Freeman Tilden sets this definition in the context of the over-riding aim of revealing the significance of a site to non-expert visitors





What do we understand by Interpretation?

From a sign or a board

To a visitor centre



What is Heritage Interpretation does?

- it provokes visitors' curiosity and interest in what may be an unfamiliar topic or theme
- it relates the site or objects to visitors' own knowledge, experience, background and values
- it reveals the significance of the site or objects which visitors can understand and appreciate, and
- □ it helps people to enjoy a satisfying experience

What is Interpretation?



Interpretation is primarily a communication process that helps people make sense of, and understand more about, your site, collection or event.

Association for Heritage Interpretation



The chief aim of interpretation is not instruction, but provocation.

What is Interpre-tation?

Any interpretation that does not somehow relate what is being displayed or described to something within the personality or experience of the visitor will be sterile.

Planning for Interpretation

Planning

- Why is interpretation needed?
- Who is it for?
- What are you going to interpret?
- How are you going to do it?
- What is the impact on tourism?

Why are you doing it?



It can be part of heritage management, tourism and community development (for example)

Define your aims at the start and agree on them

For example, visitor management aims may be about where your encourage people to go, at what time, and what services they will find there

Don't forget there must be something of interest though!

To attract more visitors

To enhance the visitor experience

Your visitors

- What do they want to know/do/see?
- What will strike them on your site
- What senses can you use?
- What can they see that's new to them?
- What can they hear?
- Get them to touch things tree bark, soft moss, find something hard and cold...
- Can you find something for them to smell?
- What about eating something? If it's safe of course!

Media: techniques you could use


Means: your budget and resources
