Wines of Alentejo Sustainability Programme (WASP)







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Alentejo Wines Sustainability Programme aims to support economic agents in improving the environmental, social and economic performance of the region's winegrowing activity.

It also aims to promote the recognition of the sustainability performance of the region's wines as an instrument to respond to an existing market failure and to state the Alentejo brand in internal and external markets.



Objectives



Articulate the entire wine chain in Alentejo within a philosophy of social, environmental and economic well-being at a local and regional level, with emphasis on the incorporation of ecoefficiency principles with the aim of promoting a more efficient use of resources, encouraging the reduction and reuse of coproducts by reducing internal operating costs





Identification of producers' performance, comparing results among peers.



The Programme is a voluntary initiative. In order to begin implementation, it is compulsory to carry out a selfassessment.

This was developed to be a standardised methodology in line with the reference framework, to be completed by the adherents and with a performance levels assessment matrix. It is intended that this self-evaluation respects the classic methodology of continuous improvement of a system and it will therefore be compulsory to carry it out annually.

The self-assessment is organised into three distinct. An overall Sustainability Category is established after completion of the selfassessment with 108 primary criteria and 63 secondary criteria, some of which relate to waste management, land management, energy efficiency, etc.



Scope

Nº OF CRITERIA

After completion of the selfassessment for the 11 Primary Intervention Chapters, an overall ranking called the 'General Sustainability Category' will be established. This ranking will fall within one of four ranges defined for the General Sustainability Category (Pre-Initial, Initial, Intermediate and Developed). The 11 Primary Intervention Chapters were developed with 108 criteria.







SECONDARY INTERVENTION CHAPTERS

In a second implementation phase released in 2018, the evaluation method was adapted to accommodate the increase in Chapters. This started the evaluation and implementation of the Secondary Intervention Chapters for eligible members, according to the WASP rules. Wine Quality

Evidences of success



The Programme began to be planned in 2013, having been officially launched to producers in May 2015.

With a strategy based on actions with quick benefits and low investment (low hanging fruits) 11 Primary Intervention Chapters (CIP) were opened, in order to demonstrate to the producers, the clear benefits of joining and implementing the programme.

This strategy showed almost immediate results, with the Programme counting 93 members at the end of 2015, a number that has been increasing every year

In 2018, 7 new intervention chapters - Secondary Intervention Chapters (SICs) were opened and made available to members who had already reached the recquired amounts in the primary intervention chapters.



This European Innovation Partnership for Agricultural Productivity and Sustainability launched in 2012, by the European Commission, promotes the best European projects at the level of innovation in agriculture, forestry in rural areas. The competition received more than 200 entries from 13 countries.
