Stakeholder involvement – why? CliMobCity Interreg Europe

Idea: early stakeholder involvement helps:

- to create more inclusive and integrated plans/policies
- to get a smooth policy process
- to achieve desired results

Ideally:

- joint problem formulation
- joint aims, ambitions
- joint development of solutions ('co-creation')
- cooperation in implementation



Cooperate across institutional boundaries

Involve citizens and stakeholders



Arrange for monitoring and **evaluation**



Assess current and future **performance**



Assure quality

Degrees of Citizen Participation

(How) are citizens involved?

Direct

who to address, how to guarantee sufficient 'coverage'/involvement, what is the legitimation?

Indirect

do voters feel represented? How is feed-back organised?

Specific point of attention: minority / special interest groups (ethnic, socio-economic, age, abilities)

^{*} citizens 'have a voice', but no decisional power
